U.S. WOMEN KICK OFF FALL TRAINING: A total of 17 players will be part of the U.S. Women's National Team fall training session. The session started on Oct. 12 and will go through December. Four players – outside hitter Cynthia Barboza (Long Beach, Calif.), middle blockers Christa Harmotto (Aliquippa, Pa.) and Elisha Thomas (Grass Valley, Calif.), and libero Nicole Davis (Stockton, Calif.) – will only train with the team for part of this week before transferring to their professional volleyball commitments. Other middle blockers training include Jen Joines Tamas (Milpitas, Calif.), Tracy Stalls (Denver), Alexis Crimes (Rancho Cucamonga, Calif.) and Mekana Barnes (Highlands Ranch, Colo.). The outside hitter group includes Kim Glass (Lancaster, Pa.), Angie Pressey (Lake Mary, Fla.) and Julie Rubenstein (Camarillo, Calif.). Setters in the fall training session are Courtney Thompson (Kent, Wash.), Nellie Spicer (Barrington, Ill.) and Bryn Kehoe (North Bend, Ohio). Heather Hughes (Fallbrook, Calif.) is the only opposite in training during the fall. The libero position has Stacy Sykora (Burlison, Texas) and Jessica Fine (Tarzana, Calif.) working out at American Sports Centers. U.S. Women's National Team Head Coach Hugh McCutcheon (Christchurch, New Zealand) is hopeful the current training group will expand during the second phase of the off-season training period starting in mid-January with the addition of current collegiate seniors. "We are committed to building a year-round training program for our National Team players and providing training opportunities for our elite athletes who are unable, or choose not, to compete in professional leagues during the winter months."

LOGAN TOM SCORES 21: Logan Tom (Salt Lake City, Utah) scored 21 points for Asystel Volley Novara on Oct. 10, but it was not enough in a five-set loss to Scavolini Pesaro in a SEAT Supercup 2009 first-round match. Tom connected for 19 kills on 40 attempts for a 48 kill percent. She added two blocks in the match. Tom and Asystel Volley Novara begin the Italian Serie A league schedule on Oct. 18 against Chateau d'Ax Urbino Volley.

McCUTCHEON TAKES SPOKESMAN ROLE: U.S. Women's National Team Head Coach Hugh McCutcheon (Christchurch, New Zealand) has taken on the role of spokesman for Human Option's 2009 Men's Task Force program "100 Men, 1 Voice, 1 Campaign." Formed in 2004, the Men's Task Force is activated each October for Domestic Violence Awareness Month to bring attention to the damaging behavior. The group aims to bring awareness of domestic violence among men. In five years, the campaign has raised \$216,000. For more information on the campaign, visit www.humanoptions.org. As part of the Human Option's latest educational programs is the "Jason's Story" project, which focuses on teaching teenage male athletes how to understand and control their negative emotions, how to deal with their anger in non-violent ways, and how to have healthy relationships with family, friends and girlfriends. "We are trying to raise awareness and money to combat domestic violence," McCutcheon said. "We are also using Jason's Story as an educational tool to teach young men in high school and club sports on how to deal with anger in relationships. Part of the project is to reach people at young age, bring awareness and prevent future domestic violence whenever possible." According to Steve Churm with Human Options, McCutcheon was selected based on status within the sports world and member of the community. "Hugh is certainly a widely respected sports figure after his success with the U.S. Men's National Team in Beijing," Churm said. "He is also a well-respected member of the community here in Southern California, especially in Orange County where volleyball is becoming what we call the mecca for the sport with indoor and beach volleyball being so popular." Churn is also pleased that the 2009 Men's Task Force has exceeded its goal of \$50,000 for this year. "I am very excited to report that the project has raised over \$60,000 with a few days remaining. However, we are not stopping and will continue to look to raise money and awareness for the project."

NNAMANI HONORED BY HIGH SCHOOL ALMA

MATER: Ogonna Nnamani (Bloomington, Ill.) was honored by University High School, her prep alma mater in Normal, Ill., on Oct. 7. She was inducted into the Pioneer Hall of Fame in a pre-match ceremony as part of the school's homecoming festivities. Nnamani, a two-time Olympian who helped the U.S. Women's National Team to the 2008 Olympic Games silver medal, earned the 2000 Gatorade National High School Player of the Year award as a senior at University High. She led her prep squad to state championships in 1999 and 2000. Nnamani, who took this summer off from competition with the U.S. Women's National Team, has hopes of earning a third Olympic Games roster spot in 2012. Yet, the Stanford University graduate is also looking into attending medical school in the future.



UNDERGRADUATE COACHES:

Foluke Akinradewo (Plantation, Fla.) and Lauren Paolini (Ann Arbor, Mich.), both middle blockers with the U.S. Women's National Team this past summer, are completing their educational degrees this fall at their college alma maters. While school books are part of the routine, Akinradewo and Paolini are also in a teaching role as undergraduate student coaches with their respective college programs. Paolini is assisting University of Texas this fall, while Akinradewo is on the sidelines for Stanford University. Both programs are currently ranked among the top five of the latest American Volleyball Coaches Association top 25 poll. Texas is ranked second, while Stanford is ranked fifth.

International Volleyball Fact Sheet

Introduction: Volleyball has major international competitions every year and, at its highest level, is a physically demanding sport played by some of the world's most elite athletes. Of course, volleyball is also a popular recreational activity enjoyed by more than 38 million persons in the United States (more than any team sport but basketball) and more than 800 million persons globally, making it the world's most popular participant sport. This fact sheet is designed to provide more understanding about international volleyball and its major competitions, including the Olympic Games.

International Governing Body: The international governing body for volleyball is the Federation Internationale de Volleyball (FIVB), headquartered in Lausanne, Switzerland. The FIVB is the world's largest sports federation, with more than 200 member nations. Under the direction of its president, Dr. Ruben Acosta of Mexico, the FIVB oversees the administration of volleyball throughout the world and is responsible for producing several major events, including the Olympic Games, World Championships, World Cup, World League and World Grand Prix.

National Governing Body: The national governing body (NGB) for volleyball in the United States is USA Volleyball, formerly known as the United States Volleyball Association. Founded in 1928, USA Volleyball is responsible for the administration of all forms of volleyball in the United States, including producing the annual USA Open Volleyball Championships, Junior Olympic Championships and the USA Outdoor National Championships. As mandated by the 1978 Amateur Sports Act, USA Volleyball is responsible to the U.S. Olympic Committee (USOC) and the FIVB for training and nominating the teams which represent the United States in the Olympic Games and other important volleyball competitions worldwide.

Major Competitions: The four major events on the international volleyball calendar are the Olympic Games (men and women, indoor and beach), World Championships (men and women, indoor and beach), World Cup (men and women, indoor), World League (men, indoor) and World Grand Prix (women, indoor). All events are conducted quadrennially, with the exceptions of the annual World League/Grand Prix and the biennial Beach World Championships.

World Rankings: Following the decision of the FIVB Board of Administration, a new system of point attribution based on a new scale has been implemented for the FIVB World Ranking of Volleyball National Teams. The following competitions are now included:

- Senior World Championships included for four years - 25 percent reduction each year. Points are also granted for the qualification matches, to the best non-qualified teams.
- Olympic Games included for four years - 25 percent reduction each year. Points are also granted for the qualification matches, to the best non-qualified teams.

- World Cup included for two years - 50 percent reduction the second year.
- Senior Continental Championships included for two years - 50 percent reduction the second year; points are also granted for the qualification matches to the best non-qualified teams.
- Men's World League / Women's World Grand Prix included for one year.

The site, usually separate for the men's and women's competitions, is determined by the FIVB based on bids received from interested cities. World Cup: The World Cup is held every four years, in the year prior to the Olympic Games. Though originally held at various sites, it has been hosted by Japan since 1977. Prior to 1991, the World Cup took place in the year immediately following the Olympics. The 12 berths in the World Cup for men and women are gained in the following manner:

- Host country (Japan- Men and Women)
- Defending World Cup champion
- Winners of the five zone championships
- The highest-placed team (of each zone) not qualified for the Olympic Games in accordance with the ranking of the zone championships.

The other zones are Europe, Asia, Africa and South America. The frequency of zone championships competition varies in each of the five sections. Any nation in a particular zone may participate in its zone championships whenever such a competition is conducted.

World League and World Grand Prix: The World League features the top 12 men's volleyball teams in the world in competition for a total purse that has grown to \$15 million since the inaugural season in 1990. Teams are divided into three, four-team pools and each country playing the other teams in their pool four times (twice at home, twice on the road). The winner and runner-up in each pool advance to a seeded playoff round. The regular season is usually played in May and June with playoffs in early July.

The World Grand Prix is the women's counterpart to the World League, and offers a total purse of \$2 million to its 12-team field. Teams play in different four-team pools each weekend, at round-robin tournaments hosted by cities throughout Asia. The three teams with the best records join the host country for the Grand Prix Finals. The regular season is played in August and early-September with playoffs in mid-September.
