**UPDATE ON TOM:** Logan Tom (Salt Lake City, Utah), a three-time U.S. Olympian, aided her Japanese V-League team Hisamitsu Springs to two victories over the past weekend. The two victories allowed Hisamitsu to move up to up fifth place in the league standings. Tom provided 10 kills and a block in a 25-21, 25-20, 25-21 victory over Hitachi-sawa on Jan. 10. In addition, her service reception was nearly flawless with a 78.9 percent positive serve-receive on 19 chances. On the following day, Hisamitsu Springs dropped Takefuji Bamboo 18-25, 25-22, 25-20, 25-17. Tom netted 22 kills on 57 attacks and two blocks. She had 22 successful service receptions on 32 attempts for a 65.6 successful percent.



**UPDATE ON HANEEF-PARK:** Tayyiba Haneef-Park (Laguna Hills, Calif.), a two-time U.S. Olympian, scored 15 points for Pioneer in a Japanese V-League match on Jan. 10, but it was not enough as NEC captured a 25-20, 25-22, 25-22 victory. Haneef-Park tallied all 15 of her points in the three-set loss off kills, including an 8-for-16 attack from the back row. After a day off, Haneef-Park and Pioneer competed against third-place Toray on Jan. 12. She scored 19 points against Toray, but like the match against NEC, was not enough in a 25-19, 25-21, 25-15 loss. Haneef-Park contributed 18 kills on 41 attempts, including six kills from 15 back-row attacks. She added a block in the loss. Pioneer has slipped to eighth place in the V-League standings with the consecutive losses to open 2009.



**BOWN UPDATE:** Heather Bown (Yorba Linda, Calif.), a three-time Olympian and middle blocker on the silver-medal winning 2008 U.S. Olympic Team, helped her Italian Serie A professional team Monte Schiavo Banca Marche Jesi to a 25-17, 25-15, 25-16 victory over Minetti Vicenza on Jan. 11 at Jesi, Italy. Bown reached double-figure scoring with eight kills on 10 attacks and two blocks. Jesi, with a 10-4 record and 30 points, is in third place in the Italian Serie A standings. Jesi travels to Tena Santeramo (3-11) on Jan. 18 for its next Italian Serie A match.

**SCOTT-ARRUDA UPDATE:** Danielle Scott-Arruda (Baton Rouge, La.), a four-time U.S. Olympian middle blocker, helped her Italian Serie A professional team CGF Recycle Florens Castellana Grotte move up the standings with an upset of Asystel Volley Novara on Jan. 11 at Castellana Grotte. She provided 11 kills on 26 attempts with just three errors, one block and one ace for 13 points in the 25-20, 25-23, 25-23 upset at home. Scott-Arruda's club improved to 8-6 on the season and moved into sole possession of seventh place in the standings with 23 points. She and Castellana Grotte will travel to second-place Foppapretti Bergamo on Jan. 18.



**NNAMANI UPDATE:** Ogonna Nnamani (Bloomington, Ill.), a two-time Olympian, continues to lead her Turkish professional team Galatasaray. She produced a team-high 16 points, double the output of second-leading scorer Stacey Gordon of Canada, in a 25-23, 25-15, 25-18 loss to Eczacibasi on Jan. 10. Nnamani totaled 15 kills on 39 attempts to go with a block.



**METCALF UPDATE:** Nancy Metcalf (Hull, Iowa), a 2004 Olympian for the United States, scored 14 points to lead Eczacibasi Zentiva to a 25-23, 25-15, 25-18 Turkish professional league victory over Galatasaray on Jan. 10. Metcalf, who was unable to compete for a 2008 Olympic Games roster spot due to injury, notched 10 kills on 26 attempts with just two errors, along with a match-high four blocks against Galatasaray. The match reunited Metcalf with 2004 Olympic Games teammate Ogonna Nnamani.

**WILLOUGHBY UPDATE:** Kim Willoughby (Napoleonville, La.), a 2008 U.S. Olympian, did not play for her Italian Serie A club Despar Perugia in its Jan. 10 victory (25-22, 25-11, 25-17) over Tena Santeramo. Perugia, tied for eighth place with 22 points, goes to sixth-place Unicom Starker Kerakoll Sassuolo on Jan. 17 for its next match.

**UPDATE FROM RUSSIA:** The Russia Super League, with U.S. Olympians Kim Glass (Lancaster, Pa.) and Jen Joines (Milpitas, Calif.) competing on different squads, has been on break since Dec. 13. Glass and fifth-place Universitet-Belogorie face Leningradka on Jan. 18. Joines and 10th-place Fakel challenge 11th-place Indesit on Jan. 18.



**TOUR OF GLORY:** Volleyball teams and fans from around the country can celebrate USA Volleyball's success in Beijing at the Tour of Glory on Jan. 17-19 at the High Performance Volleyball Academy (HPVBA) in Lakewood, N.J. Representing the U.S. Women's Olympic Team will be Lindsey Berg, Nicole Davis and Stacy Sykora. Other headliners at the event will include U.S. Men's National Team Head Coach Hugh McCutcheon, past Olympians Eric Fonoimoana, Pat Powers and Sinjin Smith, and Kevin Barnett, who was one of NBC's commentators at the 2008 Olympic Games in Beijing. USA Volleyball experienced unprecedented success at the 2008 Olympic Games in Beijing, winning gold medals in indoor men's volleyball and men's and women's beach volleyball and a silver medal in women's indoor volleyball. **OLYMPIC COMMEMORATIVE APPAREL ON SALE:** USA Volleyball has unveiled five commemorative logo designs to appear on apparel saluting USA Volleyball's medal successes at the recent Olympic Games and Paralympic Games in Beijing. Apparel can be purchased by visiting <http://usavolleyball2008.com/store/>. Men's and ladies' T-shirt designs are \$15, while the youth T-shirt size is \$13. Long sleeve t-shirts are \$18, crew sweatshirts are \$23 and hoodies are \$30. Sizes XXL and larger have a slightly higher price. USA Volleyball's success on the Olympic grand stage in Beijing has never been achieved by any other nation since volleyball was added to the Olympics in 1964. The U.S. Olympic Men's Indoor Volleyball Team, which was named the United States Olympic Committee Team of the Month for August 2008, captured the gold medal at the Olympic Games without losing a single match. Women's Beach Volleyball (Misty May-Treanor and Kerri Walsh) and Men's Beach Volleyball (Phil Dalhausser and Todd Rogers) both came back from Beijing with Olympic Games gold medals. The U.S. Olympic Women's Indoor Volleyball Team captured the silver medal in Beijing, as did the U.S. Women's Sitting Team during the Paralympic Games. No other country has ever participated in the gold-medal match of all four Olympic Games volleyball disciplines during the same year. Team USA added a fifth gold-medal appearance at the Paralympic Games.

**2009 PAN AMERICAN CUP COMING TO MIAMI:** USA Volleyball will host the Eighth Annual Women's Pan American Cup June 26-July 4 in conjunction with the USA Junior Olympic Girls' Volleyball Championship in the Miami area. The nine-day Pan American Cup, which will tentatively have three of the four 2008 Olympic Games semifinalists (Brazil, USA and Cuba), will be played on the campuses of the University of Miami and Florida International University. "USA Volleyball is extremely excited about the opportunity to host one of the largest international volleyball events in Miami and to pair it with the 2009 USA Junior Olympic Girls' Volleyball Championships," USA Volleyball Chief Executive Officer Doug Beal said. "It will provide a unique opportunity for our developing young volleyball players to be exposed to elite international volleyball teams from North America, South America and the Caribbean. The two events will also generate terrific excitement in the community and lead to greater popularity for the sport." USA Volleyball is hosting its first-ever Women's Pan American Cup, which serves as a qualifying event into the 2010 FIVB World Grand Prix. The event is the largest international volleyball event hosted by USA Volleyball in terms of country participation. Team USA has not hosted a women's senior-level international tournament since the 1998 FIVB World Championship Qualifier tournament in 1998. Due to international scheduling and professional league commitments, matches on domestic soil have become a rarity with only seven contests against foreign teams in the most recent Olympic quadrennial (2005-2008).

# International Volleyball Fact Sheet

**Introduction:** Volleyball has major international competitions every year and, at its highest level, is a physically demanding sport played by some of the world's most elite athletes. Of course, volleyball is also a popular recreational activity enjoyed by more than 38 million persons in the United States (more than any team sport but basketball) and more than 800 million persons globally, making it the world's most popular participant sport. This fact sheet is designed to provide more understanding about international volleyball and its major competitions, including the Olympic Games.

**International Governing Body:** The international governing body for volleyball is the Federation Internationale de Volleyball (FIVB), headquartered in Lausanne, Switzerland. The FIVB is the world's largest sports federation, with more than 200 member nations. Under the direction of its president, Dr. Ruben Acosta of Mexico, the FIVB oversees the administration of volleyball throughout the world and is responsible for producing several major events, including the Olympic Games, World Championships, World Cup, World League and World Grand Prix.

**National Governing Body:** The national governing body (NGB) for volleyball in the United States is USA Volleyball, formerly known as the United States Volleyball Association. Founded in 1928, USA Volleyball is responsible for the administration of all forms of volleyball in the United States, including producing the annual USA Open Volleyball Championships, Junior Olympic Championships and the USA Outdoor National Championships. As mandated by the 1978 Amateur Sports Act, USA Volleyball is responsible to the U.S. Olympic Committee (USOC) and the FIVB for training and nominating the teams which represent the United States in the Olympic Games and other important volleyball competitions worldwide.

**Major Competitions:** The four major events on the international volleyball calendar are the Olympic Games (men and women, indoor and beach), World Championships (men and women, indoor and beach), World Cup (men and women, indoor), World League (men, indoor) and World Grand Prix (women, indoor). All events are conducted quadrennially, with the exceptions of the annual World League/Grand Prix and the biennial Beach World Championships.

**World Rankings:** Following the decision of the FIVB Board of Administration, a new system of point attribution based on a new scale has been implemented for the FIVB World Ranking of Volleyball National Teams. The following competitions are now included:

- Senior World Championships included for four years - 25 percent reduction each year. Points are also granted for the qualification matches, to the best non-qualified teams.
- Olympic Games included for four years - 25 percent reduction each year. Points are also granted for the qualification matches, to the best non-qualified teams.

- World Cup included for two years - 50 percent reduction the second year.
- Senior Continental Championships included for two years - 50 percent reduction the second year; points are also granted for the qualification matches to the best non-qualified teams.
- Men's World League / Women's World Grand Prix included for one year.

The site, usually separate for the men's and women's competitions, is determined by the FIVB based on bids received from interested cities. **World Cup:** The World Cup is held every four years, in the year prior to the Olympic Games. Though originally held at various sites, it has been hosted by Japan since 1977. Prior to 1991, the World Cup took place in the year immediately following the Olympics. The 12 berths in the World Cup for men and women are gained in the following manner:

- Host country (Japan- Men and Women)
- Defending World Cup champion
- Winners of the five zone championships
- The highest-placed team (of each zone) not qualified for the Olympic Games in accordance with the ranking of the zone championships.

**World League and World Grand Prix:** The World League features the top 12 men's volleyball teams in the world in competition for a total purse that has grown to \$15 million since the inaugural season in 1990. Teams are divided into three, four-team pools and each country playing the other teams in their pool four times (twice at home, twice on the road). The winner and runner-up in each pool advance to a seeded playoff round. The regular season is usually played in May and June with playoffs in early July.

The World Grand Prix is the women's counterpart to the World League, and offers a total purse of \$2 million to its 12-team field. Teams play in different four-team pools each weekend, at round-robin tournaments hosted by cities throughout Asia. The three teams with the best records join the host country for the Grand Prix Finals. The regular season is played in August and early-September with playoffs in mid-September.
